Ven. Ariyawantha, a Burmese/Rakhine monk who studied at Nalanda MahaVihara in Bihar and previously stayed at Bodhisukha Monastery in Kolkata, is now living near Guwahati, the capital of Assam in Northwest India. For several years, he has resided in a small remote mountain village. He is the only monk in the area, and the villagers, mostly Buddhist, greatly respect him for his erudition, kindness, and teaching. He has been staying in a dilapidated monastery. His oneroom kuti has no proper toilet, no water supply, and no electricity. He would like to improve the monastery and make it more comfortable, not only for himself, but for the devotees when they come to visit.

- Improving the access road to the monastery
- Installing a water tank
- Constructing a toilet
- Connecting to the electric grid
- Adding a separate room for worship and teaching
- Perhaps offering scholarships to students from the village to attend Bodhisukha School in Kolkata.
- Initial cost: US \$2000














After Ven, Ariyawantha retunned to Assam in early February, he visited Meghalaya, the neighboring state for a ceremony. There, he experienced shortness of breath and chest pain. He quickly returned to Kolkata for a medical examination. Ven. NandoBatha, the abbot of Bodhisukha Monastery, had him admitted to Apollo



Hospital, the best cardiology hospital in West Bengal. (Bodhisukha has long had a close relationship with Apollo Hospital through the kidney-transplant program for patients from Myanmar at the monastery.)

We just received the news that Ven. Ariyawantha needs an immediate stent implant. Indeed, the surgery may be taking place at this moment. The procedure will cost about US \$2000. Donations to help cover this emergency are welcome.
